Expanding Critical Care at a Critical Time

The time is now to build Island Health's first permanent High Acuity Unit. And you can help.

It's CRITICAL

It's Critical is a \$7 million campaign to expand critical care capacity at Royal Jubilee Hospital





Equipment today.

\$1 million funds urgently needed critical care equipment in response to COVID-19

Capacity for tomorrow.

\$6 million builds a new, permanent 8-bed High Acuity Unit at RJH

Today—more than ever—our hospitals need you. If you ask our frontline care teams to name the greatest need in our hospitals, the answer is simple: critical care expansion.

Your Victoria hospitals are critical care referral centres for over 850,000 patients from across Vancouver Island. Your neighbours, friends, and families depend on them for help they can't get at home. Royal Jubilee (RJH) and Victoria General hospitals (VGH) admit more than 1,300 critical care patients to their Intensive Care Units (ICUs) each year—the very sickest of the sick. Those who are most vulnerable.

We all know our Island population is growing and aging. With that comes increased strain on our hospitals and care teams. In the last ten years,

RJH has seen an 83% increase in admissions to the ICU, and only a

38% increase in bed capacity—our hospitals need more resources.

Greater critical care capacity was needed before the pandemic. COVID-19 has only highlighted the urgency—and accelerated the response. To best assist our Island Health colleagues in the face of this challenge, your Foundation launched

It's Critical in April 2020. It's Critical is a \$7 million campaign to increase critical care capacity for Vancouver Islanders and build Island Health's first permanent High Acuity Unit (HAU), right here in Victoria at Royal Jubilee Hospital.

You can help nearly double the critical care capacity at Royal Jubilee Hospital.

Today, when you give, you're helping those recovering from high-risk heart, cancer, or vascular surgery. Those struggling to breathe. Those with stroke or multi-organ failure. Those whose blood pressure drops unexpectedly. Those with complex infectious diseases like COVID-19.

Caring for the Whole Island

The last 10 years saw an 83% increase in RJH ICU admissions with only a 38% increase in critical care beds

A Growing & Aging Population



In the next 10 years, Island Health's service area population is expected to grow by 9%, with those 75 and older growing by 66%

? What is a **High Acuity Unit** (HAU)?

- → HAUs are an intermediary step between Intensive Care and Acute Care wards
- → HAUs relieve stress on ICUs, inpatient units, and Emergency Departments
- HAUs provide a high level of nursing attention for patients from all areas of care: surgery, cardiac, cancer, respiratory, and vascular patients
- HAUs add additional critical care capacity to help our hospitals manage admissions surges such as during influenza season or in response to COVID-19

You can increase the number of critical care beds at Royal Jubilee Hospital by 73%.

You can help our frontline care teams respond to today's critical care challenges, and tomorrow's emergencies. Help put urgently needed life-saving equipment into their hands.

You can give RJH eight new beds, vital signs monitors, a central monitoring system, an ultrasound, and other advanced equipment.

When you give, you also help fund construction and equipment for Vancouver Island's first permanent High Acuity Unit—something every other health authority in BC already has.

"My colleagues and I have wanted an HAU for years. The time is now... but we can only do it with your help," says Dr. Omar Ahmad, Department Head, Emergency & Critical Care Medicine for Island Health.

This is the highest priority need in our hospitals right now. You can preserve and protect the care that we all depend on, right here at home.

"I've been here for 20 years and for much of my time, we've wanted to establish a High Acuity Unit.

As time's gone on, there are more people living in Victoria and people are sicker when they come into hospital.

We need an intermediary level of care."





When more than half of all healthcare encounters at our Victoria hospitals require medical imaging, it's no wonder these tools are sometimes referred to as "the modern stethoscope."

Imaging allows our care teams to see what's happening, this instant, inside your body. Images help them understand sources of pain, discomfort, or uncertainty. Images help perform less invasive, life-changing treatments. Images help us map out the big picture.

But to do it, our care teams need


powerful equipment. Clear, detailed, high-resolution images. Because every picture tells a story. Because everyone deserves reassurance.

With sound waves, ultrasounds create images that show clinicians what's happening inside a patient's body. Helps them observe symptoms including pain, blood clots, and abnormal growths. That saves patients from other time-consuming diagnostic tests—even surgery. Ultrasounds

are your doctor's modern stethoscope, their high-tech compass.

These images guide a surgeon's hand to remove a tumour lodged between a woman's stomach and pancreas. They chart a mother's high-risk pregnancy, so she and her doctor can see the baby in real time. They help a young man, paralyzed from the neck down,

regain movement in his arms and upper body. They help a nurse find the vein of a woman getting IV therapy twice a week, protecting her veins from injury.

Our care teams need powerful new equipment that creates clear, detailed, high-resolution images. Donors like you can make that picture sharper and clearer.

Through *The Big Picture*, you can support surgical care. Imaging is required before, during, or after most surgeries. Over 33,000 surgeries have been performed at RJH and VGH each year.

Our care teams have extensive experience and training. Every day, they make quick, informed decisions.

Donors like you can equip them with newer tools so they can make accurate decisions, faster.

Right now, you can support Vancouver Island patients. These are your friends, neighbours, and family. You can ensure everyone has access to the best treatment and recovery possible. So they can live to their full potential.

Rooted in Generosity Lynne's Legacy Story

A community changed by tragedy and empowered by social conscience.

Memories of 1960s Wales. A beloved aunt's generosity. These inspire local couple Lynne and John to name the Victoria Hospitals Foundation in their wills.

A Welsh Childhood

Lynne Thomas, 71, grew up in a small farming community in the South Wales

coal mining valleys near Merthyr Tydfil.

In October 1966, disaster struck the nearby village of Aberfan. Above the village, a pile

of coal waste on a mountain slope collapsed. It engulfed the local school and 19 other buildings, killing 116 children and 28 adults.

"When you see miners crying and pawing at the slurry and debris, getting nowhere, it's harrowing," Lynne says. "You don't forget those moments."

Lynne's two aunts, May and Olga Davis, enrolled in a London training hospital for nurses. Upon graduation, they returned to south Wales to work at Merthyr Tydfil Hospital.

"It was a hard struggle in Wales: there was poverty and lack of opportunity," says Lynne. "But my aunts' first priority was to get home and help the people of the valleys."

When Aunt May died, she left £1 million to her alma mater, the training hospital for nurses. "Aunt May always wanted to help and I knew her thinking:

let's help the nurses with their training and expenses."



At 25, Lynne left Wales for British Columbia. In 1982, she

met the man who would become her husband, John Henderson, in a Vancouver amateur theatre group.

Legacy donor Lynne Thomas

John started his own business and later retired in the 1990s—or so he thought. An old friend invited him to apply for a job at the BC Renal Agency. He then worked there for nine years.

Planning for the Future

After John retired again in 2005, Lynne and John left Vancouver for Victoria. Recently, in 2017, Lynne had hip

replacement surgery at Royal Jubilee Hospital. "The care I received was extraordinary. I am so thankful."

Lynne remembers when she and John first talked about their legacy.

"We didn't have a will," recalls Lynne. So they discussed the future of their estates, their core values, and what has inspired them in their lives. "We knew we wanted to support charities in healthcare and also wanted to support the arts."

"I said—why don't we give to our local hospitals through the Victoria Hospitals Foundation?" Lynne says, recalling the decision. "It's an effective way to make a difference in people's lives—when they're at their most vulnerable."

For Lynne, it all comes back to the generosity that binds a tight-knit village. Her motivation to give is about family and place. It's also a legacy that will help everyone on Vancouver Island, no matter their circumstances.

"Not everyone is wealthy and not everyone has the opportunities we have," says Lynne. "Aunt May was my role model and inspired me to give back to my community through our local hospitals."
