#### You Are Making Strides for Local Care

As many of us find relief in the longer and warmer days of summer, I feel profound gratitude for this community who continues to show up for our local hospitals and care teams to provide them relief in return.



In just over six months, more than 2,800 donors like you came together to complete the first \$4 million Recovery phase of Emerge Stronger, a \$10 million campaign to fund 200+ pieces of priority equipment. This incredible milestone continues to uplift our exhausted caregivers with the knowledge they are valued and supported, and help equip them with more tools and resources they need to provide exceptional care for Vancouver Island patients. We have surpassed the halfway mark of this momentous campaign, and there is still work to do together.

Our dream has always been that no Islander needs to travel to the Mainland or elsewhere for care. We imagine a future in which they can be treated right here at home. That's why the current focus, and the second phase of Emerge Stronger, supports local care.

Investing \$3 million in Local Care means continuing to fund Island-first equipment that keeps our world-class hospitals on the leading edge, and attracts more specialists and subspecialists. It also means that new services and specialty procedures can be performed here on the Island, so that patients will not have to be transferred elsewhere for care.

Every member of our community who receives care has a unique story. I am touched every week when I hear of a patient's journey directly, or through the eyes of their caregivers. When a patient enters one of our hospitals, they often see different specialists and spend time in multiple units or areas of care during their treatment. Our hospitals and care teams collaborate together for the best possible outcome. In each one of these areas of care our local hospitals offer, there is no question: these patients will touch equipment that donors like you helped fund. You should feel so proud.

I hope you know that your giving truly touches the lives of so many, and I thank you for supporting the local care that serves all of us.

So far, **donors to** *Emerge Stronger* **have given over \$5 million**, uplifting our hospitals and care teams throughout the *Recovery* phase, and now funding Island-first equipment during *Local Care*—the campaign's current phase and top priority.

Every year, Islanders are uprooted from their homes, their familiar surroundings, support networks, and loved ones because the specialized care they need is only available on the Mainland. Together, we can fund the equipment and resources needed to keep more healthcare services here at home. We can keep our families and loved ones together as they navigate some of life's most difficult challenges.

#### Local Care Advancements Keeping Patients Close to Home

Dr. James Scott is a neuromuscular neurologist at Royal Jubilee and Victoria General hospitals

When I moved to Victoria a decade ago, my colleagues and I transferred many more neurology patients to Vancouver than we do now. With the help of funding and community support from the Victoria Hospitals Foundation (VHF) and its donors, local care continues to advance.

It is never ideal when someone has to travel for care. The grief of being away from your home and family, and the loss of independence is significant. Often, there is also a financial toll, as well as mental health repercussions.

Advancements in recent years have allowed us to recruit more specialists and subspecialists, thanks largely to the specialized equipment VHF donors have helped fund. However, critical care capacity in our hospitals' ICUs is always a concern.

The community can make a profound difference by supporting critical care resources and priority equipment, such as new ventilators and video bronchoscopes through the *Local Care* phase of the Foundation's \$10 million *Emerge Stronger* campaign. This support leads to future advancements that will allow more patients can be treated right here on the Island.

# Island-First Equipment & Opportunities You Can Help Fund Through *Emerge Stronger:*



#### **Critical Care Equipment**

\$503,200

Help Victoria General Hospital manage critical care capacity challenges and expand local resources by funding new video bronchoscopes, ventilators, and a continuous renal replacement therapy machine.



#### **O-Arm Imaging System**

\$318,000

This Island-first technology benefits patients undergoing spinal, cranial, neurological, or trauma-related surgery. The O-Arm provides detailed, real-time internal imaging, allowing for less invasive surgeries, shortened recovery times, and improved patient outcomes.



#### **Pediatric Cardiac Ultrasounds**

\$239,000

These ultrasounds will help expand pediatric cardiac resources on Vancouver Island and are key in diagnosing and monitoring heart defects and other conditions in newborns and children.



#### Nasopharyngoscope Light Cables

\$114,000

Ear, nose, and throat (ENT) patients will benefit from these thin and flexible instruments. Equipped with a light and camera, these tools allow physicians to clearly observe down the nasal passage into the back of the throat, and identify conditions including cancer, sinusitis, trauma, polyps, vertigo, and allergies.



#### **Indigenous Scholarships**

\$80,000

Scholarships and grants to foster leadership development and career growth for Indigenous Island Health employees, helping to build and retain a more representative workforce.

### Recognizing Transformational Giving

#### Royal Jubilee Concourse Named in Honour of \$5 Million Lai Family Gift

With deep gratitude, the Victoria Hospitals Foundation is thrilled to unveil the Lai Brothers Concourse, a new name for the first floor foyer of the Diagnostic & Treatment Centre at Royal Jubilee Hospital, to recognize a transformational \$5 million gift from the Wilson S. C. Lai Trust in support of Royal Jubilee and Victoria General hospitals.

This transformational gift will help fund the High Acuity Unit at Victoria General Hospital, urgent equipment needs across Victoria hospitals, and will supplement the Lai Family Scholarship Fund, which has supported 325 Island Health staff in advancing their education since 2013.

The Intensive Care Unit Visitor's Room has also been renamed to the **Wilson S. C. Lai Critical Care Visitor's Room**, honouring previous giving from the family which had an instrumental role in the *It's Critical* campaign.

"In all that we do as a family, we are driven by our motto, *Derived from Society, Giving Back to Society,*" says the Lai family. "We hope others can join us in appreciating our doctors, nurses, and healthcare teams."



#### Manning Family Recognized for \$2.5 Million Gift Supporting Cognitive Health Initiative



In 2017, Neil and Susan Manning made a generous \$2.5 million five-year pledge to our Foundation. Their gift inspired Island Health, the University of Victoria, and the University of British Columbia to partner and launch the Neil and Susan Manning Cognitive Health Initiative (CHI). The project integrates leading-edge research and care for patients living with cognitive health issues on Vancouver Island.

To recognize their generosity and celebrate five years of the initiative, the clinic at Royal Jubilee Hospital has been named the **Neil and Susan Manning Seniors Outpatient Clinic.** 

Already, the CHI program has:

- Developed a Dementia
   Guidance System and a
   mobile app to help diagnose
   and track cognitive health
   symptoms
- Opened a Specialist Memory Clinic at the Seniors Outpatient Clinic at RJH
- Expanded the number of clinical trials available in our region
- Created direct linkages with researchers for patients to participate in local studies

"As someone whose family has been impacted by cognitive health issues, it has been a very informative and rewarding experience to learn from local healthcare professionals about their vision for this transformative project. From our initial conversations about what research had already been done, to the areas of cognitive disease that had yet to be explored, we were inspired to help.

It is gratifying to know that our giving has created more awareness of cognitive health issues, advanced research in the area, and most importantly has alleviated stress on Vancouver Island families who have been affected by dementia or other cognitive health diseases. We recognize that there is always more to do, and thank the professionals who have helped our gift make the most impact."

#### "If I Had to Be Sick, There's No Place I'd Rather Be"

Cynthia lives in Cobble Hill, where she walks her standard poodle named Lena for an hour or more every day.

But one day in February, Cynthia was walking Lena when she suddenly felt very weak.

"It was like I'd been hit in the back of the legs with a heavy object," she says.

Cynthia first experienced the sensation in 2011, but this year the episodes started occurring more frequently, and worse. Usually, they passed—but this time was different. Her heart was racing. She tried to go about her day and walk Lena as usual, but the symptoms persisted.

Worried she could be having a heart attack, she called a friend and asked him to take her to Royal Jubilee Hospital (RJH)—45 minutes away.

"When you go to the hospital, you want to feel safe and secure," says Cynthia. "The staff at Royal Jubilee are very good at calming you down and explaining what's happening."

In the Emergency Department, Cynthia's blood pressure and heartrate were elevated to concerning levels—but she was grateful just to be there.

"I was just so relieved that I made it. If I had to be sick, there was no place I'd rather be," says Cynthia. "I knew that if they could fix it, they would."

Fortunately, care teams were able to stabilize Cynthia. After twelve hours of monitoring and testing, she was diagnosed with a heart arrhythmia and discharged.

Now, Cynthia is doing well, and her arrhythmia is managed with medication. She's also back to walking Lena every day.

"Since the day I went to the hospital, I haven't had another symptom.

Cynthia was first inspired to become a VHF monthly donor in 2019 after the care she received from ophthalmologist Dr. Murray Erasmus during a retinal laser eye surgery.

"When the day comes that you have to go to the hospital, you're going to want the best care, and hospitals need funding in order to provide that," she says. "That foundation has to be there."


