This system locates and monitors cranial, spinal, peripheral motor, and mixed motor-sensory nerves, and registers muscle response during surgery. It also improves quality of care and patient safety by increasing operative efficiency and precision, reducing the risk of nerve damage, and helping surgeons find the site of any nerve injury, which helps inform surgical decisions.

Our hospitals will always be here to serve us. And they will always

Turning Standard of Care into State-of-the-Art Care

Through the *Emerge Stronger* campaign, donors to the Victoria Hospitals Foundation can help raise \$292,000 for Mitral Valve Minimally-Invasive Surgical instruments for the Heart Health program and Surgical Services Department at Royal Jubilee Hospital.

The mitral valve prevents blood from leaking back into the lungs when the heart contracts. Two per cent of the population is affected by a common disorder called degenerative mitral valve disease.

When a valve fails, the impact is serious. Patients with this condition suffer from extreme fatigue and shortness of breath. Without corrective surgery, they go into congestive heart failure and will die within a few short years. They need surgery to save their lives.

Certain mitral valve patients my colleagues and I treat are eligible for a minimally-invasive surgical option, which is not yet available on Vancouver Island. A minimally-invasive approach means that surgeons do not have to perform a sternotomy (which involves cutting the breastbone). Instead, the procedure is performed through a small space between the ribs, and the incision is only 6 - 8 centimeters, rather than the standard 20 centimeters.

As surgeons, any time we can use advanced equipment, we can provide better care. Philanthropy goes a long way towards making our communities healthier places. This new equipment will allow us to take what is currently a standard of care and turn it into state-of-the-art care.

There is a step-by-step process of improvement that is always occurring

within our cardiac program, and funding this advanced equipment is truly the next step in maintaining that excellence.

Island-First Equipment You Can Help Fund Through Emerge Stronger:



Critical Care Equipment

Help VGH manage critical care capacity challenges and expand local resources by funding new video bronchoscopes, ventilators, and a continuous renal replacement therapy machine.



Nerve Monitoring Systems \$134,000

These systems help surgeons locate and confirm the integrity of nerves during surgical procedures, enhancing patient safety to help reduce the risk of damage to facial and laryngeal nerves.



Pediatric Cardiac Ultrasounds \$239,000

These ultrasounds will help expand pediatric cardiac resources on Vancouver Island and are key in diagnosing and monitoring heart defects and other conditions in newborns and children.

Chemistry Line \$2,174,000

A new, automated chemistry line, will replace 20-year-old equipment to provide safe, reliable, and standardized chemistry testing for the RJH Core Lab.

As VHF's Data Entry Specialist, Matt McLean says every gift is unique. "Part of my role is to ensure a donor's gift is attributed to the right piece of equipment, and that



we are recognizing the donor in the right way. I process all gifts and enter them into our database." Matt says his favourite part of working at VHF is the genuine caring attitude of everyone in the office: "They all want the best for me, and they support me personally and professionally."

"I Knew if the Ventilator Stopped, I Was Going to Die."



Keith, and his partner Jack, have spent an active 37 years in the Victoria community. But their world changed on April 13, 2022, when Keith started to experience lower back pain.

"By that evening I was in excruciating pain. And that's when both my hands and feet went numb," says Keith.

Jack—a retired registered nurse (RN)—knew something was wrong and drove Keith to Victoria General Hospital (VGH). After receiving multiple tests in the Emergency Department, Keith was told he needed surgery on his neck due to a potential narrowing that was affecting his nerves.

But days later, after his surgery, the symptoms got worse.

"The numbness spread throughout my body, I was unable to swallow—and then, I was unable to breathe. At that point, I was rushed down to the Intensive Care Unit and placed on a ventilator."

Keith was diagnosed with a rare condition called Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS), in which the body's immune system attacks its nerves. As a result, Keith experienced muscle weakness and paralyzation from the neck down, and was now solely relying on the help of the ventilator to keep him alive.

"It was a terrifying time. I knew if the ventilator stopped, I was going to die."

Mechanical ventilators are complex machines that are adjusted to meet the unique needs of each patient. They assist care teams in monitoring key vital signs, improving comfort levels, and ensuring proper oxygen levels in the blood. Recently, the TB Vets Charitable Foundation made a generous \$53,000 donation to fund a new Servo-U Ventilator Unit—vital equipment that our hospitals rely on.

For patients like Keith, this equipment is life-saving.

After spending time in the Neurological Rehabilitation Unit, Keith walked again for the first time. And after four months, he was discharged from the hospital. Following his stay, Keith and Jack returned to thank all the staff for their excellent care.

"I get quite emotional to this day because those are such dedicated people," says Keith. "It was unbelievable how much care they gave me, and I was so appreciative."

Today, Keith is home and doing well, walking up to half a mile each day and continuing to get stronger.

"Keeping the equipment up-to-date, modern, and functioning properly is so important, especially for people who may not realize they need it until they actually do," says Keith. "It saves lives."

Since 1982, TB Vets Charitable Foundation has funded an outstanding \$1.5 million of urgently needed respiratory equipment at Royal Jubilee and Victoria General hospitals, helping countless patients—from newborns to seniors—receive state-of-the-art respiratory care.

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Stroke Recovery Inspires Decision to Give

In 2017, Cameron experienced a life-altering event. He was driving a car across Canada for his daughter in Toronto when he suffered a stroke in Brandon, Manitoba.

After five days in the hospital, he returned to Victoria, where he was referred to the Outpatient Neuro Rehabilitation program at Victoria General Hospital.

Cameron spent months regaining his strength and balance, driven by a number of goals. He wanted to get his driver's license back, which had been revoked, and he wanted to be able to climb the stairs of his home. He also hoped to take a long-planned golf trip in 2018, and attend his daughter's wedding.

"I was fortunate to have terrific physiotherapists and other professionals dealing with me," says Cameron. "That made a big difference in terms of my recovery. I'm over ninety percent recovered because of the springboard that I got from the program. Everything I did later to recover stems from that solid base. Now I'm feeling back on track."

Cameron made the decision to become a monthly donor after his stroke rehabilitation experience in 2018.

He says part of his reason for giving was motivated by learning how donations from community members allow priority hospital equipment to be purchased faster—and updated more frequently—than through government funding alone.

"If we want to have good hospital systems with the most advanced tools in our communities, I think it's important for people in those communities to step up," says Cameron. "I come from a family that views giving as part of the deal. Anything we can do in our community to help provide better and more advanced healthcare opportunities is a good thing."

On Thanksgiving Sunday in 2016, retired Victoria couple John and Marg never anticipated urgently rushing to the Emergency Department instead of enjoying a holiday meal with friends.

That morning, John was cleaning the windows on the roof of their home. Before he realized something was wrong, John fell off the roof and into their garden below.

Luckily, Marg found John shortly after and called 911. Having struck his head open on the rocks below, John would not have survived without the immediate help of the Oak Bay Fire Department, who resuscitated him with three to four minutes to live.

After rushing to Victoria General Hospital, John underwent seven hours of surgery on his head and legs before finally stabilizing in the Intensive Care Unit. Following several more weeks spent in the neurological ward, **the couple realized that, at the age of 75, John would have to rebuild how he lives and functions.**

After months of recovery and relearning how to walk, John started to gain his life back. "John had a great attitude to get better—whenever he's told he can't do this or that, he's set on proving you wrong," says Marg.

During John and Marg's working lives and in retirement, they spent much attention, discipline, and effort on financial conservation and growth, ensuring to make diligent plans to provide for their family.
